Transmission of Covid-19 during play	Players, officials and spectators	<p>Everyone will maintain social distancing whilst on the pitch of 1m+.</p> <p>Players will not hand any items of clothing to the umpires they should place them on the side of the boundary.</p> <p>All players will sanitise their hands every 6 overs or every 20minutes depending on what time elapses first.</p> <p>During the sanitise breaks the ball will be wiped down with a wipe.</p> <p>Players should have their own drink and should not share a cup or drink at intervals.</p> <p>When players leave the playing field they will wipe down and sanitise and playing equipment that may have been touched by the ball e.g. bats and wicket keeping gloves</p> <p>One scorer should be the scorer's box and the door should be keep open to allow ventilation.</p> <p>If during the game there is rain and the players</p>	<p>Sanitiser needs to be available for all players at the edge of the pitch along with wipes for the ball.</p> <p>Wipes should also be made available to be able to wipe the ball and stumps down.</p> <p>The umpires should have their own hand sanitiser.</p> <p>Teams will have a designated space available for the home team and away team.</p> <p>The scorers will have a table and parasol available so they are able to score outside and provide shade as to see the laptop screen when scoring.</p>

This will allow the club to acknowledge who was at the ground on that date of the game played.</p> <p>If the ball should go by a spectator they should not touch the ball. Only a player on the field should touch the ball.</p>	
Transmission of Covid-19 after the game	Players and officials	<p>Players when leaving the pitch should clean their hands with sanitiser.</p> <p>The ball and equipment should be wiped down before being placed away.</p> <p>Players may remain after the game to socialise and should continue to socially distance with people in groups of no more than 6.</p> <p>Players are not permitted to use the showers after the game.</p>	<p>Spread out tables and chairs that are available outside to allow for social distancing to be followed.</p> <p>Before players arrival all to be wiped down and cleaned with antibacterial spray/wipes.</p> <p>After players leave all to be wiped down and cleaned with antibacterial spray/wipes.</p>

		<p>clear entry and exit point for anyone who comes into the pavilion.</p> <p>There will be hand sanitiser available before entering the pavilion.</p> <p>When using the toilet facilities, one of the two doors will be kept open to reduce contact of door handles. People are advised to wash their hands and use sanitiser before leaving the toilet facilities.</p> <p>The kitchen should not be used by anyone unless attending for first aid or are working behind the bar.</p> <p>The amount of people allowed in the pavilion at one time will be 6.</p> <p>The bar staff should wash their hands regularly and use hand sanitiser when serving behind the bar.</p> <p>To access the bar there will be 2m lines separating customers at the bar.</p> <p>The card machine will be used to reduce spread of covid-19 through cash.</p> <p>Toilets access points, surfaces and sinks will be cleaned every hour to reduce risk.</p> <p>Before opening the pavilion hard surfaces will be</p>	<p>will be on doors and on entry and exit of the club house.</p> <p>The person behind the bar to monitor how many people in the pavilion at one time.</p> <p>If there is wet weather we will have two gazebos over the players designated areas.</p> <p>Spectators should return to cars and should not seek shelter in the pavilion.</p> <p>Any spectators that are entering the pavilion should write their name and contact number in a book. The club will then keep this for 21 days as per Government guidelines.</p>
