Ladies players and match officials may use the disabled toilets in the bar area. The changing rooms will not be used for players to get changed in, pre/post match team talks or kit storage, however they can be utilized for a area to apply thigh pads and boxes</p>

					<p>on a strictly 'one in one out' basis. There will be hand sanitizer and disposable hand towels available there-in for patrons to use.</p> <p>The grounds will remain closed to all spectators and bar patrons, however, should accompanying family members require the use of ablutions they should be afforded the use of them in line with club hospitality but they will come under the responsibility of the playing member in order to maintain control of those outside of MCC's direct circle of influence and rules. Away players, officials and spectators will come under the responsibility of the away captain and will be required to sign in to the ground without exception and the ablutions if they are used.</p> <p>Administration of any First Aid requirements will be delivered by currently certified First Aiders but the First Aid kit must be bolstered with a packet of disposable masks which should be utilised if prolonged or severe treatment is required. Hand Sanitizer should be used before and after treatment regardless of the use of gloves during treatment</p> <p>A supply of hand sanitizers and disposable towels will be provided at strategic points of the ground by MCC inclusive of receptacles for their disposal.</p>

Areas include	<p>This risk assessment should be sent to the visiting captain as early as possible so that they can disseminate this to their players and agree to abide by the MCC Cricket RA, should this not be the agreed upon then the MCC captain should push for compliance from the Away Capt or cancel the match until such a time as the visiting captain and away team feel they can adhere to the rules of MCC in relation to Covid-19.</p> <p>A copy of this RA should be signed by both captains prior to commencement of the first over and should be held by the club for 3 weeks after the completion of the match.</p> <p>All players should arrive in their own transport with a minimum number of persons in accompaniment.</p> <p>Those that are there should be from the same social bubble and household.</p> <p>Both teams will be required to bring their own camping chairs/deck chairs to sit, socially distanced, between innings/lunch breaks.</p> <p>Players must arrive dressed in the appropriate kit ready fro play as no changing facility will be offered at Park Street to either Home or Away teams.</p> <p>The player's area, for the batting team, will be marked off and only</p>

					<p>officials, players and spectators, using the ablutions, will enter this area.</p> <p>Stumps, sight screen sanitizers and inner circle markers will be placed by elected members of the home team and retrieved, post match, by the same players who will sanitise before and after their respective duties.</p> <p>Boundary markers will not be utilized to reduce contact</p> <p>All Warm-up activities will be done without the use of a ball or without passing anything between players. There will be no shaking of hands prior to the game and the Home Captain will provide the coin for the toss from their own pocket and return it there without it being touched by the umpires or away captain.</p> <p>Hands must be sanitized prior to the commencement of the first over, and immediately before entering the field of play, by all players including wicket keepers, umpires and scorers.</p> <p>A hand sanitisation break will be taken every 6 overs, personal drinks may taken at this point if required. Players will only been allowed to return to play once they have sanitised their hands.</p> <p>The ball will be provided to the umpire, who has sanitized at this point, still in its wrapping which the umpire will dispense of prior to giving it to the opening bowler. The Ball will be sanitised by the umpire prior to every over, when a catch</p>
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					<p>has been taken, when the ball leaves the field of play and prior to the commencement of play after a period of break (Sanitizer breaks, lunch, lost ball or injury or other lengthy interruption of play)</p> <p>There shall be no group celebration at the taking of a wicket inside 1 meter distance and batsman should not confer, between overs/wickets, closer than 1m apart.</p> <p>Sight screens will be positioned and moved to the batsman's preference by the opposing team with provision of hand sanitizer on both sight screens which must be used prior to moving the screens and again afterwards.</p> <p>Scorers will remain socially distant with one scorer in a temporary score box and the other in the regular one. Sharing of pens and stationary is forbidden.</p> <p>Players are not allowed to enter the score box and must maintain a 2 meter distance from the scoring window; this area will be cordoned off prior to the game.</p> <p>Teas will not be provided by the club and should be brought in from home for those who wish to eat during lunch. Sharing of food and beverages is strictly forbidden.</p> <p>All spectators must remain socially distant from each other at all times and those who do not adhere to this will be asked to leave the grounds regardless of playing status.</p> <p>Signage must be placed to remind all spectators not to touch a ball that crosses the boundary rope at</p>
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					<p>any point.</p> <p>Bowlers will not use bodily fluids to shine the ball.</p> <p>Umpires will not hold on to items of the bowlers clothing, sunglasses, hats or slip fielders helmets.</p> <p>In the event of wet weather then those players that have cars to retreat to should use them whilst ensuring that no other person is in the vehicle expect for those that arrived in that vehicle originally. Those that do not have vehicle to shelter in will find refuge in the marquees provided. They must remain socially distanced whilst in the confines of the tented area. The Players will take shelter, during inclement weather in the bar marquees whilst remaining socially distant. Captains should not prolong the decision to abandon the match if there is little chance of the weather improving in a reasonable time frame.</p> <p>Wicketkeepers must sanitise keeping gloves prior to the game beginning and at the completion of their fielding innings before leaving the field of play.</p> <p>Umpires will sanitise prior to collecting the bails from the floor after they have become dislodged and again after they have been returned to the top of the stumps, fielders and wicketkeepers must not assist this action.</p>

NOTES FOR COMPLETION

1. Assessment No – Use a unique assessment number.

2. Location – Name of the Club and Location to which the Risk Assessment is applicable.

3. Activity – Identify the activity being carried out. You only need to cover those activities where there is a risk of harm.

4. People at Risk - Identify who is at risk (including numbers) from the hazards identified. This may include colleagues, customers, Contractors, visitors and the general public etc. You will also need to consider young persons and new or expectant mothers.

5. Organised Event – Identify whether the activity arises from an organised event and, if so, which event. Where the risk assessment is associated with an event annotate, identify which phase(s) of the event the risk assessment is applicable to.

6. Hazard – Identify the hazards associated with the work operation to be carried out and in the place where it is to be done. Trivial hazards can be ignored and concentration given to **significant** hazards which could result in serious harm or affect several people.

7. Risk – Identifies the most likely worst-case effect of the hazard if it occurred.

8. Initial Assessment – Is the assessment of risk using Risk Rating criteria (see below) assuming normal control measures are in place.

9. Control Measures Implemented – Identify those control measures and precautions to eliminate or reduce risk to the lowest possible level.

10. Adjusted Assessment – Additional Controls are those that may be desirable, but due to restraints such as excessive cost, or not available within a given time. Is the revised assessment of risk following the application of control measures determined by assessing the likelihood of an event (L) occurring and the severity of that event (S) should it occur. Giving a numerical value to these assessments, using the Table below, and then multiplying the 2 values achieves a Risk Rating (RR). This will be either an Initial Assessment (IA) (before control measures are applied) or an Adjusted Assessment (AA) (after control measures are applied).

11. Sign-Off by Assessor and Manager – Certifies that a suitable and sufficient assessment of risk has been carried out by a Competent person and that any residual risk, where it remains, has been reduced to as low as is reasonably practicable.
